

tomb with the disciples unable to believe that life might find us even in the midst of death. We meet the Risen Christ beside the lakeshore and struggle to understand some of life's deepest mysteries.

One of the ways in which the miracle of life in the midst of death is made real here at Trinity is through Memorial donations we receive in memory of friends, family. neighbours and fellow church members who have died. These donations help us to continue the work that our deceased loved ones so faithfully pursued in life. It means that their contribution to this church community lives on after we are no longer able to share the joys and struggles of church life with them in person.

When you are making funeral arrangements for yourself or a loved one, consider naming the church community as a desired recipient of memorial donations. You might be surprised by how big an impact you can have by placing such an invitation in your obituary or funeral plans.

Here at Trinity, memorial gifts can be designated in a variety of ways. Trinity's Memorial Fund is set aside for the work of Worship and Christian Education in this congregation.

Memorial gifts are also gladly received to any other ministry of the church. designated or

undesignated. lf vou wish. acknowledgements of your gift will be sent to the family of the one you remember, as well public as а acknowledgement when we dedicate memorial gifts each vear.

raised to the new life that comes out of death. It's that death part that gives us pause we look forward as to resurrection.

Lent is the time when we take a long, hard look at ourselves to see what needs to die in order that we might truly live. Where is the abundant life God intends for us being blocked by fear, hatred, or despair? In what ways have we become accustomed to, even content with, a status quo that falls short of the fullness of life that God offers?

The transformative power of resurrection follows when we become truly ready to let go of ways of thinking. those believing, and acting that limit our capacity to receive and to share God's boundless love.

The first step towards readiness is to become aware-aware of how our attitudes and actions are getting in the way. That's what Lent is for, to take the time to look deeply and honestly at our lives. To identify what needs to change.

What must we let go of, in order that God's love might flow freely through us? May each of us make space in our life this Lent to ponder this question.

The Lenten invitation to selfreflection is both personal and

> communal. Let us pray for courage to collectivelv undertake an examination of our church well ลร Where do our beliefs. structures, or practices get

in the way of living out the gospel call to justice and compassion?

What is blocking us from fully embracing reconciliation and relations? riaht Or from becoming a truly bilingual and intercultural church?

How do fear, apathy, and selfrighteousness harden our hearts to the needs and concerns of others? What must we allow to die in our church in order that God may work resurrection among us?

The Lenten road of selfexamination is not an easy one. But it is well worth the effort. For as we learn to die to that which does not give life, we open ourselves to the power of God's grace to bring us into new life.

May this be the path we choose during this season of Lent.

Transportation to Church

The Leadership Team of Trinity would like to make it



easier for seniors to get to and from church. We have an experiment that we'd like to try: the Handivan has agreed to make a special "Trip to Trinity" once a month on communion Sundays from Queen's Court. Windsor Estates and Dalton Grove. Volunteers from Trinity will escort seniors to and from worship on the Handivan. Trinity will cover the cost for a flat rate of \$120 per Sunday. If you live in one of those buildings, you can help by using the service. If you don't live there, you can help by coming early for coffee or tea and visiting at 10 a.m. in the sanctuary on those Sundays. Donations will also be gratefully accepted to help defray the costs of offering this service and can be made through your regular offering envelope or in the office during the week. Communion Sundays are: March 27 (Easter Sunday), April 17, May 15 (Pentecost Sunday) and June 12.

The Refugee Project

The last time we were able to report to you



through this newsletter, our refugee coalition had just begun its work. Many of you will know that much has happened over the last months. The coalition has worked hard to prepare for the arrival of two families. We have been matched with two families from Syria, who are currently in Lebanon. Each has two parents, and three children (mostly boys!) We are currently waiting for them to be cleared for travel.

Do you have some time to spare? Once the families arrive, there will be many opportunities for those who wish to help them get settled into our culture and We community. will need people willing to drive them around, help them with English, and extend hospitality through conversation. You are invited to call Trinity (204-857-4471 or trinityu@mts.net) if you are available to help in any of these areas.

Please note that all of our volunteers who will be having direct contact with the Syrian families upon their arrival will need to have completed a Criminal Records Check and a Child Abuse Registry Check. If you have not already done so, and would like to be part of the group offering support and hospitality (including drivers) when the families arrive, please be in touch with the church office (204-857-4471) so that we can help you navigate the required screening processes without charge.

Hot Cross Buns

Hot Cross Buns are older than you think! Eavptians Ancient offered them to their moon goddess at



the Spring festival. The tradition had become popular in the Greek world by the time of Jesus and by the 6th century, Christians were using them as part of their Easter celebrations.

Most European countries have some sort of special bread that is served at Easter, and hot cross buns have filled that role in Great Britain. Canada. Australia, the United States, South Africa, India and New Zealand. In 1592, Queen Elizabeth I passed a law declaring they were special so could only be sold for burials. Good Friday and Christmas. The penalty for violating the law was that the baker's entire stock of buns must be given to the poor.

English folklore says that buns baked and served on Good Friday could hang in the kitchen for an entire year without going mouldy. Hanging a bun in the kitchen is said to help all the other baking turn out better for the year and protect against fires. The bun hung in the kitchen would not be eaten unless someone was sick and then a small piece would be mixed with water and given as medicine. Hot cross buns were taken on sea voyages to prevent shipwrecks. Sharing a hot cross bun with a friend was said to cement the relationship for the next year. An Irish nursery rhyme goes: "Half for you and half for me, between us two, good luck shall be."
