Christmas Around The World

Have you ever wondered how people in other places celebrate the Advent and Christmas seasons? What traditions bring



meaning to others and what new insights might they shed on our own celebrations? This year during Advent we will travel around the world to explore how the Christmas story takes flesh in different places.

Advent 1 <u>December 1</u> Germany and Europe

Germany is the birthplace of many of our Advent and Christmas traditions such as Advent wreaths, Advent calendars and Christmas trees. Germany is also well known for Christmas markets, children writing letters to the Christ Child, and Christmas angels. Come and explore what a "Frohe Weihnachten" might look like.

Advent 2 <u>December 8</u> Australia and the Pacific

What would it be like to celebrate Christmas under the heat of the summer sun? Christmas comes at the beginning of summer vacation for children in Australia and celebrations often include barbecues, picnics, beach days and camping trips. Fresh seafood is often on the menu for Christmas Day rather than turkey. Carols by candlelight

are also popular and most communities host one featuring local bands and artists singing

Christmas music. You're invited to wear bright, summerinspired clothing!

Advent 3
<u>December 15</u>

Mexico and Latin

America

One interesting feature of Advent in Mexico is a procession called Las

Posadas. Posada is Spanish for Inn or Lodging and Las Posadas remembers Mary and Joseph's journey to Bethlehem. Nativity scenes (often lifesized), fireworks and poinsettias (which grow wild in much of Latin America) also feature prominently in Mexican holiday festivities. Christmas Eve, known as "Noche Buena", is a very important day with family celebrations and Midnight mass.

Advent 4 <u>December 22</u> Egypt and the Middle East

The Middle East is the geographic setting for our biblical Christmas stories, but Bethlehem today has changed a great deal since biblical times. Now a Palestinian community, Christians celebrate Christmas in Bethlehem with Jews and Muslims and an intriguing mix of cultures and traditions. There are processions and festivities in Manger Square, complete with chicken shawarma, falafel, and a big screen viewing of the Midnight Mass. Jesus' early life was spent in Egypt, and about 15% of Egyptians are Christian today. They belong to one of the oldest Christian

denominations in the world, the Coptic Church. In Egypt (like in Ethiopia and Russia and other places where the Coptic or Orthodox tradition is prominent), Christmas isn't until January 7. For Coptic Christians, the 43 days before Christmas are called Kiahk and during this time Christians observe the Holy Nativity Fast by not eating any animal products. On Coptic Christmas Eve, people go to worship usually starting at about 10:30 p.m. and sometimes going until 4 a.m. After that they go home to share a meal which includes all the things they couldn't eat during Kiahk. The traditional Christmas greeting is "Eid Milad Majid" which means "Glorious Birth Feast".

If you wish to top up your 2019 donations, they must be received in the office no later than **noon**, **December 31**, to be eligible for the taxation year 2019. Charitable donations in Manitoba (after the first \$200) receive a 46% tax credit. This means that if you pay income

tax, you costs you half of w give.

A note of thanks from ALF leadership ...

Thank you to Trinity United Church in Portage la Prairie for hosting 62 participants (grade 7 to 12), 27 young leaders (16 to 28 years) plus Julie Baker as chaplain, Reynold Anderson as Knowledge Keeper, and Twila MacNair as regional staff. The volunteers at Trinity kept us well fed (thanks Robin, Jocelyn and your many helpers!) as we explored the theme of "Where in the World" - connections between faith and land: in the bible and today. Over the weekend, we learned and connected with one another through games, singing, worship, dancing, and swimming in Portage's awesome wave pool. We also spent time in age based home groups for small group discussion, games, and relationship building activities. Rey shared some Indigenous teachings and invited those who wished to join him outside the church at sunrise each morning for a pipe ceremony to offer our prayers to The Creator.

The ministers at Trinity included us in a very participatory worship service on Sunday morning, including Bible quizzes on our devices ...and prayers, spoken by the children of their congregation, and then sent on some pretty amazing flights from the balcony into the hands of random congregation members who were encouraged to pray the prayers throughout the week.

Thanks to all the young people who participated in and led the retreat and thanks to Communities of Faith and individuals who shared their resources to offer this experience young people.

Robert Allen



and recorded that same year by Perry Como. This song and others like it are popular even decades after they were written, I think, because there is a longing in many of us to be surrounded by the people we love at Christmas-time. I think "home" in this sense is likely less about a place and more about the people.

Most of us have probably experienced years where the circle around the table was incomplete because we couldn't travel home for the holidays or some of our family was not about to make it home. When someone we love has died, that sense of incompleteness is even more acute. We know that next year and the year after that, there will be an empty place in our sense of home every holiday season. It is okay to be sad in these moments. Our memories often bring us a mixtures of joy and tears.

Sometimes it can be meaningful to acknowledge someone we are missing at Christmas time by making a contribution in their honour an organization or cause they believed in. Are you on P.A.R.?




Have you thought about making your church donation by P.A.R. (Pre-Authorized Remittance)?

Friday Study Group



Beginning in early January, the Friday morning study group is going to be exploring a new book called Grounded: Finding God in the World by Diana Butler Bass. Dr. Butler Bass explores what she describes as a major transformation in how people understand and experience God. The distant God of conventional religion has given way to a more intimate sense of the sacred that is with us in the world. Grounded guides readers through our contemporary spiritual habitat as it points out the ways in which people experience God everywhere in the world around us - in the soil, the water, the sky, in our homes and neighborhoods, and in the world as a whole. Anyone who wants to join us on the journey is most welcome. Our Friday group meets each week at Queen's Court from 10:15 to 11:45.
