Attend church virtually from wherever you are on Sundays!

It has been a full year since we began livestreaming Sunday worship from the Trinity

sanctuary via the Zoom platform. Through internet technology, we have been able to offer a way for people to come to church from their homes, whether that's in Portage or even from locations in Saskatchewan or Ontario. As you will see elsewhere in this newsletter, the leadership team is working on plans to enhance safety as we gather in person this fall. However, regardless of plans or shifting public health orders, we will continue to offer online access to Trinity services. At this time, we will continue to utilize Zoom for the live Sunday morning experience. We will also record portions of the Sunday morning gathering to be uploaded to our YouTube channel for any time viewing. You can find the link to our YouTube channel on our website, or go to YouTube and search for "Trinity Portage".

For any who have not yet had the opportunity, here are instructions for accessing our Zoom Livestream. If you have a mobile phone or tablet, download the zoom app, and on Sunday mornings, go to the app and click "Join a meeting". Enter the meeting ID: 646 070 0716. You will be asked for a passcode which is: trinity. Some people prefer to click on the link

(also listed weekly in our Facebook group, our regular emails or on our website), and let the app open from there. In this case, you will not be asked



for the passcode. If you access through a browser, rather than the app (on a desktop

computer for example), you can just click the link, and it should take you right to the live feed.

When you enter the meeting, say "yes" when you are asked to join audio, or you won't be able to hear anything. You can still control whether vour microphone or video is on. You can also choose whether to keep the close captioning on your screen or to hide it, if it's distracting. You are invited to discover the chat function. where you can type a message to anyone else online, or submit a prayer request.

You can also listen to the live feed on your land telephone line. You will have to dial a long distance number, so depending on your phone plan, you may incur long distance charges. When you dial in, you will enter the meeting ID: 646 070 0716. Any of the following numbers will access the zoom feed, even though they are routed through different parts of Canada:

Communities in Bloom and Manitoba 150

"I had the privilege of taking over Trinity Garden 2 years ago which had been built over many years with volunteers from Trinity under the stewardship of Moorhouse. Brenda The majority of the plantings are perennials that have been in place for many years and seem to do very well along the south and east sandstone walls of the church. Spring emergence of these plantings takes place about two weeks earlier than anything I have experienced at my home or in town generally.

The perennials range from tulips, daffodils in the early Spring to lilies in early Summer with day lilies flowering in early daisies, varrow and July, hollyhocks along with the striking purple Russian sage and a few others I haven't identified. There are stone crop ground cover in some areas and variegated dogwood, cistine cherry, globe cedar and hedge-type coniferous to round out the planted shrubs.

The garden has one large tree which is a rosy bloom crabapple, under which are planted 3 or 4 varieties of hostas. On the annual side, the UCW committee from the church annually provides so called fusible combinations of three or four varieties of flowers typically involving petunias.

These were planted mostly along the east side of the church along with a variety of marigolds that were contributed by a member of the church.

I planted in addition a border of dusty miller along the same side and also a row of canna lilies which I have propagated for many years on my own property. Many canna lilies are also planted along the south wall at various locations serving as a counterpoint to the perennial shrubs and flowers mentioned above. Also the north side features hanging baskets of petunias from Solomon's as well as a planter which was built and added of the north along one entrances of the church.

This year was challenging in establishing the annuals due to the many gusty windy days from every direction in the month of May and early June. The late threats of frost were also challenging in preserving the annual plantings. Just to fill in and accent a few areas. tomato plants and pepper plants were also added. I am also trying to establish a few roses and the verv challenging clematis".

From The Stewardship Team We are pleased to report that as at the end of July, we are surplus! showing а This surplus is as a result of 3 major factors, we have received a total of \$15,000 from the province of Manitoba, we have been taking \$2,083 per month from our "Investing in our Future" fund and we currently only have one minister. We do not anticipate receiving any further money from the province and we are hopeful our ministry staff vacancy will be filled in the near future.

Our offerings to the end of July, both in person and by PAR, are \$2,259 less than our budgeted offerings. Thank you to everyone who continues to support our church despite not being able to attend church in person.

We invited Cornell Pashe to speak in June on the topic of Circles of Reconciliation and Treaties. We were extremely pleased with the turnout of attendees, of which 35% were nonmembers of our congregation.

September 30 is Orange Shirt Day

Orange Shirt Day has recently been recognized the Federal bv Government as a new statutory holiday: a National for Truth Dav and Reconciliation. It is meant to give public servants an opportunity to recognize the legacy of residential schools. The designated paid holiday for federal employees also addresses one of the 94 calls to action from the Truth and Reconciliation Commission:

"We call upon the federal government, in collaboration with Aboriginal peoples. to establish. as a statutory holiday, a National Day for Truth and Reconciliation to honour survivors, their families, and communities, and ensure that public

commemoration of the history and legacy of residential schools remains a vital component of the reconciliation process." In Portage la Prairie, the history and legacy of residential schools is close to home; indeed Trinity United Church had a very close

relationship with the Portage Residential School for many years. (For more about Trinity's connection to the residential school, visit the history tab on our website). The Leadership Team hopes to be able to place a visible reminder of that history with a simple exterior display at the church on September 30. We invite everyone to wear orange, and participate in local commemoration events. as public health orders allow. Grand Chief Arlen Dumas (Assembly of Manitoba Chiefs) issued a statement when the bill was passed, saying, in part, "I note that this now national day on September 30th each year began as a grassroots movement of First Nation people. Phyllis Webstad, who is from the Stswecem'c/Xga'tem First Nation, was simply one voice that spoke out about her experience in residential school and her voice grew to a National day of recognition eight years ago. I remind everyone that it takes just one unwavering voice to stand in their truth; just one voice that calls out for others to join;



which then becomes a set of voices that stand in unison and speaks out: which then becomes the voice of an entire

country that now stands as in unison to demand change and action. This is a reminder to all, that a single grain of sand can tip the scales. To all First Nations and allies alike, please join that voice; join that call to action. "

"I don't know – maybe?"

There are SO many questions before us these days. А month with ago, vaccination rates increasing, there was



great optimism that we were moving out of the pandemic stage of life with Covid-19. And then we started to hear concerns about what the fourth wave might look like, due to the movement of the Delta variant. And suddenly old questions reemerged. What is the capacity of our building, and what size of gatherings are allowed? Are masks required? When can we go back to singing? When can we serve coffee and cookies?

What about children's programming? When will church start to feel more normal again?

It seems that the common answer to these and all the other questions across sectors from recreation to education from community organizations to churches to businesses is "I don't know - maybe?" At their recent meeting, the Trinity Leadership team struggled with creating a vision for next steps. What can we do? When? How? It was determined that at this time, we assume that some among us are unable to be vaccinated (we know for certain that this is true for those under the age of 12). We also, that while assume, vaccinations are а good

protection against the most serious outcomes of the virus, they do not prevent the circulation of Covid-19. We assume that public health orders are going to shift and shift again over the next few months. We therefore must take a cautious approach to protect the health and safety of all people, particularly the most vulnerable among us.

For now, we will maintain the pattern of hvbrid online/in person Sunday gatherings that we have been using for the last number of weeks. For those who attend church in person, physical separation will be maintained and we will encourage those from separate households to sit 6 feet apart. If indoor mask use is mandated. will abide bv that we requirement, but even if it is not mandated, we will encourage mask use, particularly when

people are not seated, but moving about in the building. We will continue to find

alternative options to congregational singing - using pre-recorded music. live instrumental music. and perhaps soloists (if we have any volunteers? - Be in touch with Julie if you have other ideas). We are committed to being a place where children are welcomed and safe, but we are challenged to come up with a safe option for children's programming at this time. We would welcome hearing from those who are also invested in these principles, who would be interested in figuring out what a new vision for Sunday School might look like. We are considering options for ways to share food and drink safely together, and are hoping to be able to offer a communion service in the church building

on October 3. As always, we will encourage people to observe good hand hygiene practices and to stay home if you don't feel well, and come to church online or by phone instead.



Becoming Nakuset: The Story of a Sixties Scoop Survivor September 8, 2021. 6:00 -7:30 p.m. (Manitoba time)

Nakuset, a Cree woman from Lac la Ronge, Saskatchewan, is a well-known Indigenous activist and Executive Director of the Native Women's Shelter of Montréal. As a young child, she was taken from her home in Thompson, Manitoba and adopted into a Jewish family in Montreal. Becoming Nakuset is her story. After a screening of the short film, Tony Snow (Indigenous Minister, Chinook Winds Region), will guide us through a Listening Circle with both Nakuset and Dan Milner, also a survivor of the Sixties Scoop agenda.
