A Note from Julie...

If you have spent any time driving around Portage this summer, you will have no doubt had to take roads you didn't expect. Construction projects of



various kinds have resulted in plenty of detour signs sending you on a path that wasn't where you planned to go. As many of you are already aware, my life took a rather dramatic detour this summer when I was diagnosed with a kind of blood called multiple cancer myeloma. It was a sudden and dramatic turn; my bone biopsy. diagnosis and first chemo treatment happened on the same day!

I am now engaged in weekly chemo treatments, which come with all sorts of unpleasant side effects; my health team calls this the 'learning phase', where we discover how I respond to the treatment. In good news. the tests indicate that the chemo is doing what it is intended to do, which suggests that I will continue this course of treatment for the full 16 weeks. and then proceed to the next phase, which will include bone marrow consolidation (transplant). Unfortunately, in the meantime, my ability to do regular life tasks has been severely limited, and I have had to step back from most of my work at the church. Your leadership team has been very supportive, and is working with me to find ways that I can be involved or helpful in church life, even as I am unable to do very much. I am so grateful for the prayers that have been shared, and the good wishes, flowers, cards and tomatoes that have found their way to my

inbox or my door! I deeply

appreciate the kindness, support and care. I am also deeply grateful to the members of the M & P committee who have been working hard to sort out how to

cover the needs of our church when I am unable to fulfil them. I am also grateful for everyone's gracious patience and flexibility as we discover what I am able or unable to do and as others step in to do things they never have done before. May God be with us on this detour for our church community, and may we find hope in the wisdom of our tradition: "Even though I walk through the valley of the shadow, I fear no evil, for you are with me, your rod and your staff they comfort me." (Psalm 23:4)

#Every Child Matters

Friday, September 30 is Orange Shirt Day, Canada's National Day for Truth and Reconciliation.

Orange Shirt Day was created as an opportunity to discuss the effects of residential schools and their legacy. It honours the experiences of Indigenous Peoples, celebrates resilience and affirms a commitment that every child matters. The symbol of the orange shirt references a real orange shirt taken from residential school survivor, Phyllis Webstad. She is one of more than 150 000 First Nations, Metis and Inuit children who attended Indian residential schools in Canada between the late 1800s and 1996. These schools were operated by the Canadian government and church organizations like ours, and

were part of Canada's official policy to eliminate Indigenous Peoples' languages and cultures, and through assimilation, cause them to cease to exist as distinct peoples. It is estimated that between four to six thousand children died at residential schools, many of whom are buried in unmarked graves that are still being found today.

In a spirit of truth and reconciliation, Trinity United seeks to acknowledge our own connection with the history of the Portage Indian Residential School, and we invite people to participate in Orange Shirt Day. Here are some of the ways you can do that.

On Friday, September 30, orange ribbons will be placed on the front steps of the church. Please feel free to come and add your own orange ribbon to the display. Wear orange, and take steps to learn more about the legacy of the residential schools to our community. If you don't have your own orange ribbon to add, the church office will be open with ones you can use on September 30 from 11 a.m. - 1 p.m. You can also drop in during that time to learn more about the Portage Indian Residential School, the residential school system, and how The United Church of Canada has been engaged in the work of truth and reconciliation.

Trinity is also a sponsor of the activities that will be held at the National Residential School Museum (Rufus Prince building, Crescent Road West). As specific information about that program becomes available, we will share it, but feel free to simply stop by and see what's going on. We will also share (by email and social media) various educational opportunities as the day grows closer.

Creation Time



Those of you who have been around Trinity for some time will recognize the various colours that adorn our sanctuary throughout the year. In Advent we see blue for hope; in Lent, we use purple to show our learning and lament. White shows up for Christmas and baptisms and funerals. Red is the colour of the spirit at Pentecost. They are called "liturgical colours" and represent the seasons of the church year. Green is the colour of 'ordinary time', which comes between various seasons. A number of years ago, a new season was added to the liturgical calendar, that (for a variety of reasons) we never got around to adding to the Trinity calendar. It is called the Season of Creation, and is usually observed through September and the first half of October. The colour for this season is orange, chosen because it is a warm colour, associated with enthusiasm, creativity, fruitfulness, endurance and strength, as well as with sunrise and sunset, fall and harvest, and the changing seasons, nature's last burst of colour before winter. It is the red of passion tempered by the yellow of wisdom. Thanks to Sandra Falk for creating an orange pulpit hanging for us to use this year, as we join the Christian church around the world celebrating the season of creation.
