Thinking about our memories and those we love can also invite ourselves to as the question "how do I hope to be remembered?"

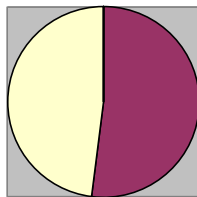
You can often make a sizable financial contribution to an organization whose work you believe in by placing an invitation in your funeral plans to

## Deadline for 2024 Contributions!

If you wish to top up your 2024 donations, they must be received in the office no later than **noon, December 31**, to be eligible for the taxation year 2024. Charitable donations in Manitoba (after the first \$200) receive a 46% tax credit. This means that if you pay income tax, your donation costs you roughly half of what you give.



## "Snowflakes" for M&S

When you give to Mission & Service, people living in poverty receive food, shelter and clothing. Refugees are safer and more secure until times are better. Children receive tuition, uniforms or simply a good breakfast so that they can stay in school. Immediate support during crisis and natural disaster is provided and long term support is there after it has passed. Through Mission & Service, you help transform lives and inspire meaning and purpose. Each year during Advent, Trinity puts an extra focus on M & S gifts. This year, a hand made snowflake decoration will be added to our tree for every M & S gift made through Trinity during this season - showing us how we are building a better world together. ## Service of Remembrance and Hope



The holidays can be hard for those going through a tough time. Those who have experienced hardship - like the loss of a loved one or a painful divorce - are twice as likely to associate the holidays with negative feelings like sadness, loneliness and worry. At this time of year, it has long been our practice to offer a special Christmas service for those who are experiencing loss. Because it is an emotional time, sometimes loss is felt more keenly, and we can feel isolated if we don't share the feelings of celebration that appear around us. We have been creative about how we have offered this service over the past few years. This year, we will offer a brief prepared and pre-recorded service that those who are grieving can access at the time that works best for them, whether it is in the middle of a sleepless night, or just before a Christmas event. You are welcome to watch it together with those in your circle who might be feeling the same way. It will be available through the Trinity website and YouTube page the second week or so of December. ## How to Survive a Winter Service When the Boiler Has Broken Down

Canada can be cold, and church heating systems are temperamental. It is circumstances like these that separate the average United Church attender from the hardcore worship enthusiast.



1. Keep your parka on. The expression "Sunday best" should be expanded to include clothing that is well-insulated from the cold. Mittens, toques, down-filled coats, and boots say "I love my faith, but I'm not willing to risk hypothermia for it."
2. Re-evaluate your need for personal space. Especially if only a small but faithful remnant have braved the cold, huddle together in one pew to share body heat.
3. Candles add warmth. Okay, not a lot of warmth – light bulbs actually give off more heat – but candles also give off a cheery glow that creates the impression of warmth.
4. Keep moving. Tap your feet. Clap. Dance. Let the Spirit move you, and in the process keep the blood moving to your extremities.

I am surprised and humbled but the number of people who made donations to the Mission and Service Fund in honour of this occasion. Thanks to your generosity, we were able to send a sizeable gift of **\$3,714!** That's simply amazing. In this world of tension, division and bad news, we are called to celebrate however we can. May we carry this joy with us as we continue on. -Julie Baker



## Happy Holy Days

For 64 years, I have been a Christian, for 30 years a minister, and 3 of those years the spiritual leader and

senior elected official of The United the United of Church of Canada. I am not “dabbling” in Christianity. I’m not messing around. I’m a bonafide Jesus-loving capital C Christian. I celebrate Christmas – merry and otherwise – *every year*. I’m all in.

Between November 1 and January 15, however, there are 29 religious holidays observed by seven major religions.

Please, don't ask me to name them all, but Christians let's

agree, we aren't the only religious rodeo in town over the next two-and-a-half months.

Besides, we pillaged our best Christmas traditions—dragging trees inside, mistletoe-kissing, hanging lights, yule logs, elves the like—from European Pagans. Thank you, all you Pagans out there, for up-sizing our celebrations of Jesus' birth. I am whispering here: *Jesus wasn't a Christian. He did not celebrate Christmas by hanging a sock up on the donkey for his birthday.* We made it all up. Christmas, in North America for the most part, is a celebration of capitalism, consumption and consumerism and has absolutely nothing to do with brown Jesus the refugee born into poverty.

But, here's the pop in your Christmas cracker: Jesus loves us, anyway. He practiced radical, expansive, unconditional love - unconcerned about the multiplicity of ways people celebrate joy, compassion, generosity, light, hope, justice and love. I want to play for that team.

So, at Christmas, and all year long, I want to blow the doors open on Jesus' love for the world, not lock it down. I'll greet you with a cheerful, open-hearted Happy HolyDays, however, and whatever you are celebrating **because** I am a Christian.

If you insist on wishing your Muslim, Jewish, Hindu or

agnostic strangers and friends Merry Christmas, I'm pretty sure most of them will simply smile and say “Thanks”. No one is saying you can't.

## Thank you for your continued financial support!



Please know that every donation received by Trinity is appreciated and for each donation we are truly grateful. Thank you so much for your support! We are 10 months through the year so it's a good time to analyze our financial resources. Just a reminder, we budgeted for total income of \$229,500 and total expenses of \$317,922 resulting in an anticipated end of year deficit of \$88,419. In reviewing the Summary to the end of October, below, you will note that the actual offerings in this 10 month period is only 55% of the budgeted amount. Yes, we expect 30% of our annual offerings will be received in the last 2 months of the year....but the math doesn't total 100% of our budgeted amount! When you review our October expenses, please note that we pay 100% of Elijah's salary and receive reimbursement from MacGregor for their share. We also paid the last quarterly instalment to UCC in October. Is it time to analyze your donation budget to Trinity? In the article titled "Not as Young as I Used to Be!" by The Rev. Dave Jagger he says: "It continues to surprise me. As I approach 60, I have the most financial

resources of my life. At this point in our careers, my wife and I are at our highest earning levels yet, and at the same time our expenses are relatively low. Our kids are out on their own and the mortgage is paid off. .... I understand that this is not everyone's experience. However, for a lot of people, this is in fact the case." We are asking, are you in a situation where you can adjust your donation budget to Trinity? Are you in a place in life where your living expenses are reduced and your income and/or assets have increased? In his article, The Rev. Dave Jagger asks: "As a person of faith, as your age and your financial resources change, how generous can you be?" Please take time to consider this as we move forward through the last 2 months of 2024.

Together we shall embark on a journey to share the abundant blessings of God and promote peace and justice. Together we shall come on the table and sing "Joy to the world! the Lord is come – VU58"

May the light of God shine upon us in this advent season! Merry Christmas!

## GIFTS OF GRACE (aka White Gift Sunday)

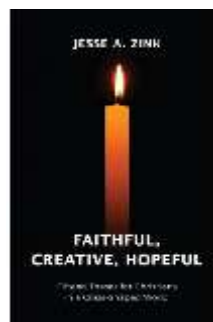
